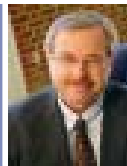

Division 36: Psychology of Religion ***American Psychological Association***

Background:

Division 36 of the American Psychological Association, *Psychology of Religion*, brings together psychologists who recognize the significance of religion both in the lives of people and to the discipline of psychology. The division is nonsectarian. Membership and division activities are open to members of all faiths as well as to those who are not religiously affiliated or do not profess a particular personal faith commitment.

The organization was established originally in 1949 as the *American Catholic Psychological Association (ACPA)*. In 1970 it was renamed *Psychologists interested in Religious Issues (PIRI)*, and in 1976 PIRI officially became Division 36 of the APA.

In 1993, by vote of the membership, the division was renamed *Psychology of Religion*. We are indebted to that farsighted group of ACPA members who recognized that mainstream psychology did not have an organization through which psychologists could easily express their interests in the psychology of religion.

This area is one of the oldest in psychology; research on religion development and experience was conducted over a century ago, and both William James and G. Stanley Hall were leading psychologists of religion. Division 36 is working to re-establish the scientific psychology of religion to the respected status it once held so firmly in our discipline.

A wide variety of psychological interests and activities exist among the members of the division. Members work in virtually every area, from experimental and statistical research to clinical work with children and adults. We are concerned with both the scientific and applied aspects of our field.

Many members do research exclusively on issues in the psychology of religion; others bring this interest to bear on a variety of allied areas in psychology. Our professional affiliates may be found working in sociology, religious studies, and other social sciences. Some members also possess clerical degrees, and integrate psychology with the requirements of a pastoral life as researchers and practicing clinicians.

The psychology of religion is integral to understanding human behavior in the widest possible sense. As a division of APA, our basic role is to show how the psychological study of religion contributes to a scientific understanding of human nature.

Purpose:

The purpose of Division 36 is twofold:

1. To encourage the development of research, theory, and practice in the psychology of religion and related areas; and,
2. To facilitate the dissemination of research data on religious and allied issues, and effect the integration of these data with current psychological research, theory, and practice.

Membership:

You may apply for membership in Division 36 at a level consistent with your status in APA. Members, associates, and fellows of APA are eligible for Division 36 members, associate, and fellow status, respectively. Student affiliates of APA may apply for student affiliate status in the Division as well. Nonmembers of APA may apply for professional affiliate status.
