Division 36 of the American Psychological Association brings together researchers and practitioners who engage psychology to explore the significance of religion or spirituality in people's lives. As a division of APA, we seek to show how the psychological study of religion may contribute to a scientific understanding of human development and functioning. The division is nonsectarian and welcomes the participation of all people who view religion as a significant factor in human living.

Our Goals

The goals of **Division 36** are to

- encourage the development of research, theory, and practice in the psychology of religion and related areas;
- facilitate the dissemination of research on religious and allied issues;
- integrate these findings into the broader context of psychological research, theory, and practice.

Our Members

Members work in nearly every area of psychology—from experimental psychology to clinical practice—and thus together they are concerned with both the scientific and applied aspects of the field. Some members chiefly pursue issues and insights introduced by the classical psychologists of religion, including such distinguished contributors as William James, Sigmund Freud, and Gordon Allport. Others draw on the current discourse, methods, and findings of cognitive, social, health, and personality psychologies. Our professional affiliates may be found working in sociology, anthropology, religious studies, theology, and other areas of the social sciences and humanities.
